William Callaghan, M.D., M.P.H. is the Acting Chief of the Maternal and Infant Health Branch in the Division of Reproductive Health at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). In this position, Dr. Callaghan provides scientific leadership to a group dedicated to research and public health surveillance in the areas of maternal morbidity and mortality, infant morbidity and mortality, and preterm delivery. During his tenure at CDC, he has been an author on numerous peer-reviewed papers, presented his work in the field of maternal and infant health at national meetings, and provided technical assistance to states engaged in the identification and review of maternal deaths. Dr. Callaghan earned B.S. and M.S. degrees in biology from Youngstown State University in Youngstown, Ohio. He received his medical degree from the Ohio State University College of Medicine in 1981, completed a residency in OB/GYN at Akron City Hospital, Akron, Ohio in 1985, and practiced general OB/GYN in Western North Carolina for 14 years in rural and urban settings. Between 1999 and 2001 he took a second residency, Preventive Medicine, at the University of South Carolina. He earned his M.P.H. degree with a concentration in epidemiology and biostatistics from that institution in 2000. He is certified by the American Board of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) and the American Board of Preventive Medicine.
